Native vegetation regulation update - codes of practice released

The NSW Government is reforming native vegetation management to deliver the right balance between sustainable agriculture and protecting the environment.

The new <u>Native Vegetation Regulation 2013</u> started on 23 September 2013 and a number of provisions have already been introduced, including:

The first three self-assessable codes are <u>now open for public exhibition</u>. These place trust in landholders to manage their properties sustainably while maintaining environmental standards.

The codes are for:

- clearing isolated paddock trees in a cultivated area
- thinning of native vegetation and
- clearing invasive native species

We encourage all landholders to review the draft Codes and make comments to the office of Environment about the applicability and ease of use.

The rules for <u>clearing native vegetation without approval</u> remain in place until the new self-assessable codes are finalised.

- working with natural ecological practices to reduce costs and improve productivity
- learning how to redesign grazing management to increase profits and improve sustainability

- identify trends which are an early warning signs to lower rainfall
- plan grazing management to maximise pasture production and animal performance
