Do you know who your local district vet is?

Our team of district veterinarians are located across the region to help you with any animal health issues

you

may

have.

District veterinarians are responsible for:

- providing livestock health services to ratepayers within the region
- · responding to livestock management and health enquiries
- investigating herd or flock problems such as sick stock, dead stock, stock that won't put on weight and infertility problems
- surveillance and reporting to certify that we are free of certain diseases and able to respond to emerging or exotic disease threats quickly
- working closely with biosecurity officers (animal health), who are currently working on National Livestock Identification System procedures, footrot programs and coordinating the National Arbovirus Monitoring Program, which involves hanging light traps and sampling sentinel cattle herds in the region.

Unlike private veterinarians, we don't provide services to individual animals or carry medications.

New barber's pole worm vaccine - Barbervax

The world's first sheep vaccine for internal parasites was launched in Armidale last month.

Known as Barbervax, the new barber's pole worm vaccine was developed by the Moredun Research Institute (Scotland) with the assistance of the Department of Agriculture and Food in Western Australia.

The vaccine gives sheep industries an alternative to drench-based control. This will help manage drench resistance and long-term pasture contamination.

Barbervax is not intended to replace current integrated pest management strategies but to add to the tools available. For more information, please click on the link below and contact your district veterinarian to discuss worm control in your flock.

Using chemicals

The use of chemicals on farms in NSW is regulated by legislation to ensure minimal negative effects on human health and the environment, and to ensure safe food for Australia and the countries we export to.

All farmers who use chemicals are deemed to be farm chemical users and have to keep records of all chemical usage.

What are PICs and what do they do?

It is a requirement in NSW for owners of livestock such as cattle, sheep, goats and pigs to have a Property Identification Code (PIC) when trading or moving these livestock.

A PIC is a unique eight-character number assigned by Local Land Services to properties with livestock. This property registration system allows for the tracing of livestock to assist with disease and chemical residue management.

Keep looking for locusts

We are encouraging landholders to be vigilant over the coming months for any locust activity on your property.

Some areas of central west NSW have experienced low to medium levels of locust activity in the autumn, with some egg laying being recorded.

The optimum time for control is when the locust nymphs are forming bands on the ground. This is usually around three weeks after hatching – early detection and reporting is essential.

Funding opportunity for local govt and not for profit organisations

The National Stronger Regions Fund is now open and closes on November 28.

The <u>National Stronger Regions Fund is</u> an Australian Government initiative to boost social and economic development in regions by funding priority infrastructure projects in local communities.

Funding will be provided for capital projects which involve construction of new infrastructure, or the upgrade, extension or enhancement of existing infrastructure.

Projects selected for funding should deliver an economic benefit to the region beyond the period of construction, and should support disadvantaged regions or areas of disadvantage within a region.

Local Government and incorporated not-for-profit organisations are eligible to apply for grants of between \$20,000 and \$10 million.

20 million trees grants now open

<u>Federal grants are available for the community</u> to plant 20 million trees by 2020. The aim of the funding is to re-establish green corridors and urban forests.

Applications close 2.00 pm on 30 October.

Applications for grant funding between \$20,000 and \$100,000 will be accepted from eligible groups, individuals and organisations intending to plant native trees and associated understorey in a range of urban, peri-urban and regional environments across Australia.

Drought recovery funding for bait, aerial, trapping and education

We are inviting community groups, Landcare and industry groups to apply for funding for pest animal education and capacity building work.

The project activities should focus on educational and capacity building activities with a focus on pest animal management (particularly wild dogs, feral pigs and foxes) in the following Local Government Areas:

This project is funded by the Australian Government to help landholders in drought affected areas to recover from drought and minimise the impacts from invasive species.

Profile: Campbell family revegetating their land

Catherine and Andrew Campbell from Narromine undertook a revegetation project on their Narromine property last year.

"Our revegetation area is growing nicely and will help us protect stock, reduce wind speed and traffic noise and stop stock accessing an eroding gully," Catherine said.



"We recommend anyone interested in doing tree planting to talk to Central West Local Land Services. It is a great way to involve the whole family."

Senior Land Services Project Officer, Andrew Knop, says that multiple environmental benefits can be achieved, reducing wind speed, soil erosion and enhancing wildlife habitat.

"Landholders can get practical assistance with the fencing, site preparation and replanting cost along with advice on design and plant selection," Mr Knop said.
