
On behalf of our Board and Staff, we'd like to wish you a Merry Christmas and a wonderful 2015!

Watch out for cowpea weevils infesting field crops

Growers are advised to inspect their pulse crops after reports of cowpea bruchid (weevil) activity in Queensland and northern NSW. These pests infest pulse crops in the field prior to harvest. Look for any signs of seed damage in the field and sieve the seed at harvest.

Wheat harvest 2014: high yields and low protein

With harvest almost complete in the north of our region and in full swing in the south, it seems that high yield and low protein is the trend this season.

For every 1 tonne/ha of wheat you've produced, approximately 20kg/ha of nitrogen has been



removed. This is the equivalent of 40kg of urea.

Perhaps it's time to invest in some soil tests ahead of the next crop season. <u>A simple soil test can</u> provide the knowledge to make more profitable decision for next year.

Native vegetation codes of practice released

Native vegetation self-assessable Codes of Practice have been released and are now on the <u>Office</u> of Environment and Heritage website.

Three codes have been released including:

- clearing of paddock trees in a cultivation area
- thinning of native vegetation
- clearing of invasive native species.

Mice on the increase

We are receiving feedback that numbers of mice are growing and demand for mouse bait material is increasing.

This is unusual for this time of year and a reminder that you must ensure safe, clean and effective storage of grains now that harvest is underway.

Monitoring for mice can be as simple as noting:

- population increases around all domestic and storage areas
- damage to storage facilities in the home (mice eating into cereal boxes)
- damage to stored grain and hay reserves.

Correct use of bait material is important, so non-target species such as domestic pets or wildlife remain unharmed.

Our biosecurity officers need to know about any population increases to prevent potential local mice plagues and to provide professional advice and access to resources.

Mesquite identified on Nyngan travelling stock route

Two mature mesquite plants have been identified by local council weeds officers on the Bogan



stock route downriver between Dandaloo and Nyngan.

Subsequently, we are restricting stock movement along the travelling stock route in this area until a thorough inspection has taken place.

Mesquite is classified as a notifiable noxious weed because it is an invasive plant spread by livestock, birds, kangaroos, pigs and foxes after eating the seed pods.

Need poison and chemical handling training?

If you are a landholder in the Bogan, Coonamble, Gilgandra, Warrumbungles and Narromine local government areas, you can access free 1080/Pindone and AQF3 re-accreditation training funded by the Commonwealth Government's Drought Recovery Program.

MAP found to be most profitable source of phosphorus

A local trial, conducted by NSW Department of Primary Industry's Research and Development Aronomist, Colin McMaster at "Duran" west of Parkes, has found that Monoammonium Phosphate (MAP) to be the most profitable source of phosphorus. Part of the GDRC funded More profit from Crop Nutrition program, the trial compared MAP with rock phosphate, Easy NP, and a polyphosphate liquid over three consecutive winter seasons.

Summer weed control trial conserves soil moisture

Recent trials in the central west highlighted the importance of controlling summer weeds to conserve nitrogen as well as moisture.

This trial, conducted at Forbes as part of the Central West Farming System's Rain and Grain project, assessed four different summer fallow treatments:

• nil spray

- first miss spray (first fallow spray missed)
- full spray
- a delayed spray (24 days after rainfall event).

The full and delayed sprays were found to conserve the most moisture over the summer fallow period.




