Wild dogs caught: relief and reminder for landholders

Three wild dogs have been recently caught by landholders in Merrygoen, Dubbo and Bruie Plains after working in partnership with Local Land Services.

While the Merrygoen dog had not been known to attack livestock, the Dubbo animal had killed over 60 sheep in the area and the Bruie Plains dog had killed at least four sheep.

· remember your skills to deal with stress



Our current advice is to:

- · control any emerging locusts over the coming weeks
- mark any known beds and talk to Local Land Services staff on monitoring and management.

Got big bull calves to castrate?

It is illegal to castrate calves greater than six months of age in NSW. The ideal age to castrate male calves is a minimum of two and up to eight weeks of age.

The younger the better as this minimises pain and ensures a quick recovery with minimal loss in production.

However, we know that sometimes circumstances arise when you may find yourselves with big bull calves from time to time. So, what's the best way to go about this?



1080 and Pindone courses near you

<u>Contact your nearest Local Land Services office</u> to find out when the next 1080 or Pindone course is running and register your interest.

Our staff run short training courses regular which will allow you to use 1080 and Pindone baits on your property.

The three-hour course will give you a clear understanding of 1080 and Pindone use and your legal obligations.

The AQF chemical application courses remain a requirement for use of any other pesticide.

The training courses are delivered by our biosecurity officers and cover topics such as baiting techniques, toxicity, storage, transport, legislation and OH&S. Those completing the course will be issued a certification card and will remain accredited to use 1080 and Pindone for five years.

A small fee is charged for the course.

Farm Household Allowance


The Farm Household Allowance provides eligible farmers and their partners who are experiencing financial hardship with assistance and support to improve their long-term financial situation.
