Pest and weed drought funding available

Land managers in drought affected areas throughout NSW are encouraged to apply for up to \$3 million through the 2015-2016 Pest and Weed Drought Funding program.

Based on the Australian Government's priorities land managers in the Central Tablelands, Central West, Hunter, Murray, North Coast, North West, Northern Tablelands, Riverina and Western Local Land Services regions are encouraged to apply before 4 April 2016.

Funding will be used to:

- reduce grazing pressure from pest animals
- reduce stock losses from pest animals
- reduce the spread of weeds.

Individuals, groups and organisations are welcome to apply for funding, which will be allocated through a competitive assessment process.

Time to check your pulse before sowing

While the dry hot weather for the next few weeks doesn't look like changing, farmers are encouraged to take a break from their busy schedules and hear what's

been happening in local cropping agronomy research. Farmers planning to sow a winter crop this year are urged to attend one of three local Pre-Sowing meetings planned for early March in either Eugowra, Woodstock and Goolma. NSW DPI research agronomist Colin McMaster will be speaking at all three meetings, outlining the latest NVT trial results. Pulse Australia's, Phil Bowden will attend the Eugowra meeting to discuss pulse agronomy and the market outlook, at Woodstock NSW DPI's Helen Burns will present recent findings from GRDC funded research into acid soils impacting on Pulse yields, and at Goolma a presentation from local private agronomist, Phil Stoddart. Working in partnership to assess seasonal conditions

Each month Central Tablelands Local Land Services
biosecurity staff liaise with a dedicated troupe of 40
farmers throughout the region to compile a detailed
assessment of seasonal conditions in the key areas of
water availability, pasture quality and quantity, and

livestock condition. Senior Biosecurity Officer, Alistair Gordon-Smith compiles and forwards the information onto the State wide unit which is then compiled into a monthly report for conditions across NSW.

Choose your representatives - enrol to vote

Three of the seven Central Tablelands Local Land Services Board members are elected by ratepayers via a voting system open to all rate payers in the region who have enrolled to vote. So that we get a good representation of ratepayers across the region we encourage as many ratepayers to vote as possible. This helps to ensure that our board is



representing the needs of our ratepayers. Enrolment is voluntary, there are two ways you can <u>enrol</u>, it only takes a few minutes.

Lessons for livestock management during a bushfire

With hot temperatures and no significant rainfall forecast, it's again timely for farmers to be thinking about bush fire risk and taking precautions to reduce the threat to livestock and other assets. "Many landholders who have been through fire emergencies in the past have learnt valuable lessons about livestock management which are worth reviewing in 2016," said Central Tablelands Local Land Services Regional Vet, Bruce Watt. Central Tablelands Local Land Services is supporting the RFS message to landholders to prepare a fire plan that includes a strategy for livestock and pet management. If you have experienced a damaging fire, Meat and Livestock Australia have released a <u>factsheet</u> outlining the broad principles which apply in managing livestock and rebuilding pastures after a fire.

Dual purpose Canola under-utilised in the Blayney area

A good crowd of 50 local producers and agronomists attended the High Country Fodder options event in Blayney on 28th January. Farmers were able to hear the latest research on dual purpose crops from CSIRO scientist Dr Susie Sprague, and how they can benefit livestock operations in the high altitude, high rainfall zone.

<u>Paraboss News</u> provides locally relevant and expert updates on what is happening in the three main animal health problems of sheep: worms, flies and lice. The

website provides detailed management information and regional programs that assist in managing these parasite risks.

Take care when you vaccinate!



Every year Australian livestock producers vaccinate thousands of animals without a problem, but if you miss and accidentally inject yourself with a veterinary product you could be off work for months and face multiple surgeries, skin grafts, gangrene and even amputation.

Dr Gary Kode, a Tasmanian-based reconstructive and plastic surgeon gave a <u>presentation</u> recently. He said, "accidental injection is relatively common in the livestock industry and many veterinary products are toxic to humans, on average a patient accidentally injected with the vaccine for the sheep wasting disease OJD will be off work for eight months and have six operations." Mapping native bushland across the Central Tablelands

Survey work has began around Orange and Bathurst on a new project to map the last remnants of natural bushland that can be found across the Central Tablelands. Areas of remnant vegetation will be classified and documented, bringing together invaluable information about the type and extent of native plants and ecological systems that have survived in the modern landscape. The surveys will assist in how to plan reconnecting native vegetation across the region.

The NSW Soil Knowledge Network is an independent group of retired and semiretired soil specialists which captures critical soil knowledge and experience. The group have released a <u>series of videos</u> that are practical but also promote just how precious this natural resource is.

Community Advisory Group meets to guide NRM across the Central Tablelands

Members of the Community Advisory Group came together in Bathurst last week to represent the views of the natural resource management and Landcare community, and provide advice to the Central Tablelands Local Land Services Board. Members were selected to ensure widespread geographic representation across the Central Tablelands and were required to demonstrate knowledge and experience in natural resource management and an ability to engage with broad networks. They will assist in guiding priorities for Local Land Services investment

in activities such as weed management, project development, and the coordination of volunteers and will work with Local Land Services to ensure the Central Tablelands strategic plan can be effectively implemented at the grass roots level to deal with problems such as pest animals and biosecurity.

Landholder survey request - private lands and conservation

Do you own or manage property with a permanent conservation agreement on the title? If yes, you are invited to contribute to an Australia-wide <u>survey</u> led by Julie Groce, PhD student, and Dr. Carly Cook from Monash University. The study would like to learn about your experiences with your conservation agreement, including the sorts of management activities that you undertake on the property and how you find information about those activities.

Domestic cat tracking project - Lithgow

The Central Tablelands Local Land Services will be undertaking a domestic cat tracking project within the Lithgow Local Government Area, with the aim of educating cat owners and promote awareness of the distances that domestic cats can roam and travel. Senior Land Services Officer Peter Evans who will be coordinating the project said "Many people have the opinion that their cat doesn't leave their back yard. I would like to challenge people to become involved in the project to see where their cats go to after dark or when they are not around". Native bees important for pollination in Central Tablelands

Over 75 land owners, who combined manage more than 21,000 ha of rural land, have indicated that they will take measures to encourage and conserve Australian native bees on their land. A series of workshops has enlightened and inspired landholders on the surprising

diversity of native bees and the unsung pollination services that these native insects play in producing our food, pastures and keeping our natural areas healthy. This coming May, Central Tableland Local Land Services will be hosting an important gathering for native bee researchers in Australia. Event participants will be compiling the most scientifically valid, practical and cost effective tools and resources that will help rural landholders and horticultural industries that rely on support from native bee pollination services.

Plant Quarantine Manual for NSW now available online

Interstate businesses importing fresh fruit, vegetables and plants into NSW also need to meet requirements such as treating produce in certain ways and having it certified before it is allowed to move into NSW. The NSW Plant Quarantine Manual is an invaluable resource to allow businesses and individuals check quickly and easily if produce is permitted from particular states and territories and if so what the requirements are.

Hazelnut mite identified in Australia

Hazelnut mite has been discovered in Australia for the first time. Authorities first identified the mite at a commercial hazelnut property in north east Victoria and have traced the mite to another property in the

Dandenong Ranges. Hazelnut and walnut growers, the nursery industry and also the truffle industry (hazelnut trees are a host plant for truffles) need to be wary. The mite feeds on the leaves and creates yellow/white-ish feeding spots reducing tree vigour. Authorities are currently evaluating the pest and undertaking surveys to gauge spread before deciding a course of action. If you suspect you might have hazelnut mite in NSW you can call the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline on 1800 084 881 or email clear photos with a brief explanation and your contact details to biosecurity@dpi.nsw.gov.au. Do not transport any plant material.

Home gardeners urged to control backyard pests

Frequent rain and hot weather over summer have produced the perfect conditions for fruit fly to thrive, heightening the risk of a Queensland fruit fly outbreak. Home gardeners or anyone with fruiting trees or veggies in the backyard have a responsibility to

reduce the spread of fruit fly, and should be taking steps to control these pests in domestic gardens. Queensland fruit fly is a major threat to the Australian fruit and vegetable industry, and failure to control fruit fly in home gardens can cause devastating problems for commercial growers.
